Parish Council Update - August 2013

The Parish Council is going through a busy period with lots going on in addition to our regular items. In this edition of the newsletter I would like to bring your attention to some of the works that are being taken forward on your behalf.

Village website – we are fortunate to have an excellent and informative village website developed and maintained by Tony Miekle. You will know from recent newsletters that Tony has been looking for volunteers to take over editorial and maintenance duties. Despite several appeals no-one has come forward. Therefore, after discussion it has been agreed that the Parish Council will take over the running of the website and Jon Radgick has kindly volunteered to become the new Editor. We will advise you of the new website address in due course. In the meantime, if you have items for the website please contact Jon on 01665 578 222

World War One Commemorations – 2014 marks the centenary of the outbreak of World War I. The Government is keen to support local communities to use the occasion to remember the lasting significance and huge sacrifices made during this terrible conflict. The Parish Council is working closely with village community groups to develop ideas about how we will mark the occasion. Glanton Memorial Hall Committee and the Heritage Group are also involved in these discussions. We intend to put together a joint grant application to support our village commemoration plans and would welcome ideas and input from local residents. A meeting to discuss this will be held in the Memorial Hall on Thursday 5th September at 7pm. Please come along and get involved.

A697 Highway Improvements – You will soon see some improvements at the Glanton/Shawdon junction of the A697 where visibility is currently very poor. We are going to remove a short stretch of hedgerow and replace it with a wire fence to improve visibility of southbound traffic. The issue of speeding traffic on the A697 is being highlighted at County Council level and the Parish Council will be contributing to this debate on behalf of all Glanton residents.

Parish Plan – Our Parish Plan published in 2008 has reached the end of its lifespan. It is time to review its function and purpose in the light of changes to the local planning framework. Parish Plans have been eclipsed by Neighbourhood Plans which cover a larger area. However, we feel that it is still important to acknowledge the priorities for local community development at a Parish Level and to ensure that these are fed in to the wider planning

frameworks where possible. It also provides a list of local action points and priorities to guide the work of the Parish Council. Therefore we are starting a review process and will let everybody know how they can get involved in developing the new Parish Plan in the next newsletter.

Finally, I would like to thank Andy Hindhaugh and the Village Show Committee for all the planning and hard work they put into this year's successful 90th anniversary event. Also Susan Williams and all those who helped plant up the new raised bed at West Turnpike, its stunning and definitely worth a look.

Heritage Open Days is in its 9th year and is England's biggest and most popular voluntary cultural event with visitor numbers last year reaching 1.7 million - an all-time high.

Several new events have been added to the calendar to ensure this year there is something for everyone. Attractions include bus trails, photography exhibitions, tours, walks and talks that bring to life local history and culture. The aim is for all residents and visitors to discover some of the county's hidden heritage treasures, for free. This is part of a national dedication to England's architecture and heritage.

Looking Through A Lens

Looking back, I was surprised how long I've been writing these pieces for. This morning as I was talking with one of our neighbours the story of Joseph was brought to mind. How was this, you might ask? Well it was because they had plans to take their granddaughter to see Joseph and his techni-coloured dream coat.

I've always loved the story of Joseph, we performed it when I was at junior school some years ago and can still remember some of the words to the songs. More recently Dreamworks produced a cartoon version of the story called Joseph: King of dreams.

The story really talks about family life, about how Joseph is the favourite and how his brothers are jealous of him, not only because of his coat of many colours, but because somehow Joseph seems to believe that he is better than they are. So the story unfolds, Joseph is sold into slavery by his brothers who just want rid of him, and they then go off and convince his father that he was killed by a wild animal.



It's quite a sad story really and would probably work well as an Eastenders story line or something! However there is a happy ending. The brothers meet again after a famine forces the family to travel to a neighbouring country, Egypt, to find food and they meet Joseph who is in charge of giving out the food. The twists and turns carry on for a few more scenes, but the upshot is that Joseph forgives his brothers and the family is once more united.

Forgiveness is hard, yet Joseph managed it, after a struggle. When we're hurt, angered or wronged are we able to forgive? Forgiveness brings freedom and release. When we struggle to forgive God can help, send up a prayer and ask for the strength. Forgiving won't always be easy, but it'll be worth it.

Glanton Show 2013

The 90th Glanton Show has been hailed as a great success – 'best ever' was heard, though the Committee are far too modest to believe that! However it was a very full day, with an extra bonus for the hill race as our very first overseas entrant (from Ethiopia) stormed around the course in a blisteringly fast time, we are renaming the event the Glanton International Hill Race next year!

After such a great start the only way was up, and the West Percy foxhounds did not disappoint – several claimed they could have covered the race course in even less time, but fortunately they were happier romping around the show ring and enjoying the company of the various children (of all ages) who were pleased to make a fuss of these beautiful dogs.

Meanwhile in the main marquee the judging had finished and what a high standard of entries there were this year – and lots of entries, thanks to all those who grow and make and create such a remarkable show of local talent. Many of us stand in awe at the quality of the produce and the skill of the photographers, bakers, jam makers, knitters and craftspeople – thank you for all being so generous with your talents!

Outside the marquee the Companion dog show was very enjoyable, with pedigrees and mutts all joining in, and Steel Quake added hugely to the atmosphere with their choice of cheerful music. The pony sports and the sheepdog trials each took place in their separate fields, if you didn't manage to pop over to look at either, do make a note to do so next year. The Classic car display was a very high standard this year with wonderful vehicles of various vintages, and a working steam engine completed the show with a couple of tremendous hoots! There was also a select band of stall holders with goods and crafts for sale and displays from the Guide Dogs and the Wildlife Trust among others.

In no time at all the next event in the main ring began, a display of flying birds of prey, which was full of drama and spectacle, and a surprising amount of audience participation – some birds seem to love the less-than-hirsute head! Scarcely had the dust settled from that and we were treated to an amazing display of chainsaw carving, a trunk of wood being transformed into an owl before our very eyes, and thanks to the generosity of Ross Macneil, the owl was sold in aid of Show funds and went off to a new home that very day.

After prizes and cups were awarded there was a special presentation to mark the 90th Show anniversary, with engraved glass vases being presented to three of the Show's most long term exhibitors, Denis Rough, Tommy Swan and Jimmy Givens, well done all! The 100 Club prize was won by Glanton resident Mrs Tait.

Cheap(er) Heating Oil!!

Many local residents are now benefitting from the OilCAN community oil buying scheme – if you've been hesitating, now would be a good time to jump in and join us, as September is likely to see the lowest price of oil this year (subject to international turmoil of course).

Although there's a small membership cost (£20 for individuals) it is highly likely that your savings on your first order will more than cover this – I saved £50 on my first order, and a Glanton resident was shocked to learn last winter that in the same week as one of the OilCAN deliveries, he had paid the same oil supplier £70 more for his delivery. Plus there are the environmental benefits of fewer tanker deliveries.

1st Whittingham BP Scout Group

It is 500 years since the Scots were defeated in a wet and bloody battle at Flodden, with most of the aristocracy and religious leaders wiped out. The cubs and scouts enjoyed tremendous area camps in July to commemorate the battle, and to learn all about it in the process - how the clever English sneaked around for a flanking attack from the east leaving no escape route for the King of Scotland and his army, how the Scottish 18' pikes were useless when they got bogged down in the mud and had to fight hand to hand, and how their heavy cannons also got bogged down, and by the time they started firing them the English were too close and they all sailed harmlessly overhead.

The cubs and scouts had a fully packed weekend learning archaeology, archery and 16th century cooking, and having a go at orienteering and a rope walk and leap of faith in the trees, a water slide (to cool off!). They also enjoyed a campfire with mixed Scottish songs and traditional scouting songs, and hikes around the battlefield, learning all about the battle, and in the case of the scouts, becoming English and Scottish army patrols attacking each other with water guns! Also a great chance to make scouting friends from all over Northumbria.

At the end of July, the scouts took off across the border to Loch Ken, near Dumfries, where they did their canoeist badge including learning lots of new skills and going on a day's paddle down to a viaduct. They also learnt the basics of windsurfing and sailing. A beautiful spot, with amazing weather. The scouts probably spent about as much time in the water cooling off as out of it!
